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THERE IS NO PLACE LIKE HOME

Our community opened their hearts and homes to shelter pets of all breeds and ages. They gave these animals the opportunity to know safety, love and care. Some pets that come to us have complicated medical conditions. CrossRoads adoptions are for those pets that are terminally ill and have limited time to enjoy life, but their adopters ensure they live the final leg of their journey to the fullest.

Foster families provide a supportive home environment for pets needing special medical or behavioral care. Often these foster volunteers make all the difference in an animal's story and prepare them for their forever home.







PROVIDING AFFORDABLE CARE

Every animal who comes through our doors receives a thorough medical evaluation by our highly skilled veterinary team. Each animal also receives a microchip, are spayed or neutered and receive rabies and other core vaccinations. Our veterinarians, technicians and support staff perform thousands of surgeries every year, and rely on their training and experience to offer each animal the very best care.

We offer a low-cost veterinary clinic that helps pet owners spay and neuter their dogs, cats and rabbits. Our clinic also offers microchipping and wellness services.









PROTECTING PETS, HELPING PEOPLE

MHHS is the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA) for Albany and Rensselaer Counties, and has supported law enforcement in the investigation of animal cruelty and neglect cases for many years.

Our Peace Officers can investigate animal cruelty, apply for search and arrest warrants, and make arrests when necessary. We are always ready to mobilize when our partners in law enforcement call on us to help with cases of animal cruelty. From active physical abuse to hoarding, neglect, and abandonment, we have to be ready to handle it all.

One of the most important roles of a Peace Officer in Humane Law Enforcement is Community Outreach. While our main focus is animals, partnering with our community is the key to ensuring animals receive the care they need to be happy, healthy and loved. When we step in with food, reduced-cost veterinary care or supplies, we can improve the lives of pets and their owners, and hopefully prevent future cases of cruelty and neglect.



BEHAVIOR AND OBEDIENCE TRAINING

Through specialized treatment plans, our Behavior and Enrichment team helped pets build confidence, improve manners, and increase adoptability. Behavior issues are some of the most common reasons pets are relinquished to shelters. But with trustworthy guidance and support, it doesn't need to be that way. Enrichment goes hand-in-hand with behavior, as adding positive activities and experiences to daily life can make a big difference.

Our free Behavior and Enrichment Helpline helps pet owners work through many common issues that, left unaddressed, may get worse and cause a pet to lose a loving home. Reliable advice from our team of caring experts is just a phone call away.

Dog training courses help you and your dog strengthen your bond as you learn fundamental skills through positive reinforcement. For those dogs that might need one-on-one attention, our skilled training staff offers private consultations to address specific behaviors.

HUMANE EDUCATION

MHHS is growing its humane education programs for people of all ages. This includes summer camps for elementary aged students and service-based programs for middle and high school students. MHHS hosts free educational programming throughout the year that is open to the public.

There are future plans to build a humane education wing to the current site to allow for expansion of these programs.

HUMANE LAW ENFORCEMENT

Cruelty and neglect cases consume an enormous amount of resources, both financial and emotional. We continue to invest in training staff and developing key community partnerships.

One of those partnerships is with Albany County. The County has offered to supply emergency safe housing for animals - especially farm and livestock - in those instances when we are called to farm cruelty cases and need to safely remove the animals.

We are also training more humane law enforcement staff to be ready to step in when these cases arise.
